

# Career Curiosity

## **Learning Outcome/Goal:**

- Students explore the full range of careers they already know.
- Students select four new careers to explore.
- Students connect a career path to the educational credentials required for that position.

### 5-10 Minutes: Outline the activity

The Bureau of Labor Statistics states that the average person holds 12-13 jobs in their lifetime. However, when asked what they want to do/be when they graduate, young people often only pinpoint a handful of possible professions.

According to a 2021 survey conducted by YouGov of 3,600 13-17-year-olds in the U.S., the top dream jobs were as follows: male-identifying students listed professional athlete, YouTuber/streamer, musician, professional gamer, and doctor/nurse taking the top five spots, in that order. For female-identifying students, the top jobs included doctor/nurse, actress, musician, artist, and YouTuber/streamer.

Unsurprisingly, roles like actuary, data scientist, or physician assistant didn't make the list. Many students' career aspirations are shaped by their surroundings and the people they know or see daily.

This activity is structured to help students reflect on the career landscape they know and inspire curiosity. It will expand students' knowledge of career possibilities and connect those possibilities to pathways to achieving a career that matches their interests.

## **Questions Prompts for Your Class**

- What is your dream job today?
- What are some of the jobs your family, family friends, or other adults in your life have that sound interesting?
- What is a job you've heard of but don't know what they do day to day?
- What are the best ways to learn about jobs that could be a good fit for you?
- Do you think it's more important to prioritize a job and then choose a college or to choose a college and let it lead you to a career path?

## ↑ 10 Minutes: Inventory and learn

Distribute the Career Inventory and review the following directions:

Take the next 10 minutes to list the careers you know and what kind of education is required for each career. Think about your family, friends, and the people in your community. What are their jobs? Keep listing occupations until you either run out of room or time.

Come back together as a class and discuss a few of the following questions that feel most relevant to what you'd like your class to take away:

- What are some of the jobs you wrote down?
- Did you feel confident about the level of education required for that job?
- Who completed their chart?
- Were there any themes you noticed when completing your chart?
- Of the jobs you wrote down, how many have you considered pursuing for your future?

After discussing a few of the questions above, outline the next step of the activity. They will now learn about different jobs they may or may not have heard of before. Encourage them to select a job they know the least about from each category. They will only choose one job from each of the following to continue to research:

- Jobs that require a high school diploma.
- Jobs that require a certificate or associate degree.
- Jobs that require a bachelor's degree.
- Jobs that require an advanced degree.

## 15 Minutes: Explore new jobs

Instruct students to use the 2nd page of the career inventory and review the following directions:

Learn about four new jobs. Pick and circle one job from each category. Once you've selected the job, visit the **Encourage** app or onetonline.org to learn about each job's salary and responsibilities.

There is space below each education level to write down what they have learned.

## 🍧 5-10 Minutes: Pair and share

Ask students to turn to the student or students next to them and share what they learned, especially as it pertains to the following questions:

- What surprised you?
- Would you consider any of the jobs you researched?

### **Optional Homework**

Involving families and communities in college and career planning can positively impact young peoples' educational and professional goals. To engage these adults, consider assigning students an interview task.

- What is your job title?



# GRADES 7—10

Use My Careers to explore part-time work.

Ask students to think about the process of applying for a job.

Discuss as a class:

Has anyone had a job interview? How can you prepare for an interview?

Student Directions:

# GRADES 7—10

# GRADES 11-12

Toggle to the **Careers** tab. Explore a matched career.

# GRADES 11—12
